

Osage River Highest Since November '51

Rainfall was the jubilant news to Miller county farmers last week and reported amounts for the recent rain was 2.59 inches. This makes a total of 3.91 inches of precipitation for the past month. Nine flood gates are open at the dam and the river reading at the Anchor Mill river gauge in Tuscumbia Tuesday morning was 20 feet. This is the highest reading since November of 1951. The rise was 4.1 ft.

Monday and Tuesday it continued to rise.

Last week the late George I. Farnham farm, located 3 miles north of Iberia, was sold to Jewell Ponder of the Hickory Point community.

OCCUPATIONS

Through the years occupations have come and gone and job names and descriptions have changed also. Here is a list of obscure and not-so-obscure occupations.

- Brewster or maltster-maker of ales, beers, and other alcoholic beverages
- Chandler-candlemaker; also seller of provisions
- Cooper-maker of barrels
- Crocker— pottery maker
- Currier—one who prepares or dresses leather for another trade; one who uses a curry comb to dress a horse
- Cutler-one who makes or sells knives or swords
- farrier-a horse doctor or one who replaces horseshoes
- Glass bender-worker in a glassworks who forms glass into curved panels or tubes
- Joiner or joyner—an expert in properties of wood who joins different woods with glue or special joints for cabinetmakers
- Muleskinner-a teamster (driver of a team of animals, not always mules)
- Ordinary-innkeeper
- sawyer—one who precisely cuts wood and makes veneers for cabinetmakers
